


Distribution of Employment by Surplus (Quasi-rent) per Worker




Distribution of Employment by Opportunity Wage Rate




Distribution of Employment by Employer Pay Premium




Job Creations by Surplus (Quasi-rent) per Worker




Job Destructions by Surplus (Quasi-rent) per Worker




Job Creations by Opportunity Wage Rate









Job Creations by Employer Pay Premium





